

## CTE Employment Outcomes Survey for Certificate & Degree Completers 2013 Shasta College Summary Results – All Programs

### Background


Students from Shasta College who earned a certificate of 6 or more units or a vocational degree in 2011-2012 were surveyed in the summer of 2013. The survey was administered first by telephone then by e-mail, addressed student perceptions of their CTE program, employment outcomes, and how their coursework and training relate to their current career.

The sample consisted of 853 unduplicated certificate or vocational degree earners, 86 of whom responded by e-mail (39.6%) and 131 by telephone (60.4%), for a total response rate of 25.4%.

### Results


Figure 1 Primary reason for studying at Shasta College

- Respondents were asked what their primary reason was to study at Shasta College. Half (50.2%) indicated their primary reason was to earn transferable units without an award. The remaining (45.7%) selected earning a certificate or degree (with or without transfer). A few (4.2%) selected update job skills or personal enrichment. Figure 1 shows the results.

- 50.7% of former students were “very satisfied” with the education and training they received at Shasta College, and 41.5% were “satisfied” for an overall satisfaction rate of 92.2%.

- 36.9% of respondents indicated they transferred to pursue a Bachelor’s Degree. Of those who transferred, two-thirds transferred within the same field and one-third transferred into a different major.


Figure 2 Current Employment Status

- 71.0% of respondents are employed for pay. Figure 2 represents the status of certificate/vocational degree earners.

- Respondents were asked, if currently employed, how closely related their job is to their field of study at Shasta College. Almost half (43.8%) indicated they are working in the same field as their studies and training, followed by nearly a fifth (21.0%) indicating they work in a field that is “close” to their studies and training, and 35.2% indicated their job is not related to their studies.
- Of those respondents who engaged in a job search after finishing their studies, 27.1% reported finding a job and 9.0% were still looking (the remaining respondents were not looking or were already employed). Of those with a successful job search, 84.2% found a job within six months (69.5% within three months).
- Before earning a degree or certificate, 36.9% of respondents worked full-time. After earning a degree or certificate, 41.0% work full-time. Figure 3 shows the results.


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*Figure 3 Work status before studies/training and after earning a degree/certificate*



- The hourly wage of completers increased 27.1% from before their studies (\$11.87) to their hourly wage after completing a degree/certificate (\$15.09). See Figure 4 below.

### Summary and Conclusions

The results of the survey show that earning a certificate or vocational degree is related to positive employment outcomes. After graduation, a majority of certificate/degree completers are employed, with about half (44%) working in the same field as their studies, and (41%) working full-time. On average, certificate/degree completers posted a 27% increase in their hourly wage after earning their credential and the vast majority were satisfied with the education and training they received at Shasta College.
