# WELCOME TO SHASTA COLLEGE

In 1950, Shasta College opened its first campus, where Shasta High School is now. There were 26 original faculty members and 256 students, with 17 students in the graduating class. President Harry S. Truman inspected the completed Shasta Dam, and gave a speech at the college's Thompson Field.

Shasta College grew so rapidly that, in 1964, voters approved a bond issue for construction of a 337-acre campus at the current main campus location. The campus opened in the fall of 1968 with nearly 5,000 students. We have doubled our student population and there are approximately 10,000 students attending Shasta College now. Fall 2020 marked the 70th Anniversary of Shasta College, serving the north state with pride and distinction.

## 3200 BUILDING I Early Childhood Education

THE ECE CENTER: operates as a child development laboratory offering age appropriate experiences for children as well as observation opportunities and hands-on training for college students. The Shasta College ECE Center Lab School has continuously earned national accreditation from The National Association for the Education of Young Children since 2004.

#### 3100-3300 BUILDING | Dormitories

**RESIDENCE HALLS:** Shasta College maintains two dormitories, one for 63 women and one for 63 men. The Residence Commons is open for both males and females, and includes kitchen facilities, movie facilities, a small computer lab, and recreational facilities. Monthly social and recreational activities are schedule dorm residents.

#### 2000 BUILDING I Student Center

**THE GRILL:** Grill, espresso bar and sandwich bar

**SIDELINE CAFE:** Pizza by the slice, salad bar and daily special.

**INFORMATION BOOTH:** students can get basic questions answered.

**PACE:** Partners in Access to College Education provides support to students with disabilities in acquiring equal access to Shasta College programs and facilities (Temporarily relocated. Go to shastacollege. edu/PACE for more info).

**EOPS:** Extended Opportunity Programs and Services provides educational guidance and financial support to eligible students challenged by economic, educational, and language disadvantages. (Temporarily relocated. Go to shastacollege.edu/EOPS for more info).

HEALTH AND WELLNESS: A registered nurse is available for evaluation of injuries and illnesses. There is a psychologist on staff and a physician on duty two days a week. The health fee you pay with registration covers these services.

**TRIO:** There are three different programs within TRIO These programs are located upstairs (Temporarily relocated. Go to shastacollege.edu/TRIO for more info).

**TRIO STUDENT SUPPORT SERVICES** provides academic support and resources for eligible transfer students.

**TRIO TALENT SEARCH** assists high school students who have the desire and potential to succeed in higher education by providing academic, career, and financial counseling.

**TRIO UPWARD BOUND** Strengthens student academic skills, assists with personal growth, increase post- secondary and career options, and helps students stay focused on educational goals.

**UMOJA PROGRAM:** Umoja (unity) enhances the cultural and educational experiences of African American and other students (Temporarily relocated. Go to shastacollege. edu/UMOJA for more info).

**THE CAREER CAFÉ:** Resource for Shasta College students seeking work while attending classes and after graduation (Temporarily relocated. Go to shastacollege. edu/CareerCafe for more info).

**CLUB ROOM:** space for student clubs and organizations.

**2100 BUILDING** I Research, Classrooms, and Economic Workforce Development

**EWD:** Invests funding and resources in industry sectors that are key to California's economic growth.

#### **2200 BUILDING I Business & Technology**

**ASSESSMENT OFFICE:** Student orientations and assessment tests.

**2300 BUILDING** I Student Services, Student Senate & Bookstore

**THE HUB:** Where students can get connected to campus and community resources and feel more engaged with their peers. It also serves as a Basic Needs Center and assists students to ensure they are well-equipped in the pursuit of their education.

STUDENT SENATE OFFICE: Students in Student Senate are campus leaders who provide student persepctive to the Shasta College administration, and serve students through the campus food pantry, the lending library, making ID cards, overseeing campus clubs, hosting the annual Giving Tree event, and more.

**LIBRARY:** Currently under renovation. Staff and library services are currently located in the 700 building.

**STARBUCKS:** Open during renovations with the entrance and patio located on the east side of the building.

# **700 BUILDING** I Tutoring & Learning Center and Temporary Library

**TUTORING & LEARNING CENTER:** Offers FREE peer tutoring, help with writing assignements, and various learning resources. Open for both in-person and online appointments.

**LIBRARY SERVICES:** Books and services study rooms, computer labs, textbooks, Chromebook and research help.

#### 300 BUILDING | Art Gallery & Classrooms

Features art work by nationally and internationally renowned artists, as well as the annual faculty and student shows. Instructional courses for fine arts are also located in this building.

#### 400-600 BUILDINGS | Theatre & Music

Instructional courses for theater, literature in production, music fundamentals, piano, voice, musical instrument, and speech can be found here, along with rehearsal rooms.

#### 800 BUILDING I Social Science

Intructional courses for English, history, sociology and psychology are located in the building, along with three large sunken lecture halls. Various vending machines can also be found here.

#### 900 BUILDING I Instructor's Offices

Social science instructors' offices. Office hours posted on their doors; however, appointments can also be arranged.

# **1000 BUILDING** I Computer Information Systems

Instructional courses for CIS can be found here, providing learning spaces for students and faculty to collaborate, explore, and develop digital and handson skills in the unique technologycentered classrooms and labs. This is also home to the business and CIS department and faculty offices.

#### 1100 BUILDING | Mathematics & Engineering

Instructional courses for math (ranging from pre-college level basic math skills through second year College Calculus), and engineering can be found here, along with various math faculty offices, and computer based lecture rooms.

# **1200 BUILDING** I Forestry and Natural Resources

Instructional courses for forestry and natural resources can be found here, offering students the opportunity to learn through hands-on field experience and enter a diverse and growing career field.

#### 1300 BUILDING I Geology

Instructional courses for geology majors can be found here, providing the foundation in both geologic processes and earth history.

### **1400 BUILDING I Physical Sciences**

Intructional courses and labs for physical sciences can be found here, which include geography, geology, chemistry and astronomy classes. Take a tour through this building to see the fossils, geology, and other physical sciences displays.

## 1600 BUILDING I Life Sciences

Intructional courses for life sciences can be found here, which include anatomy, biology, botany, physiology and zoology classes.

## REDWOOD GROVE

This is the largest Redwood Grove outside of a National Forest. It is a memorial grove and the trees have been planted in honor of past Shasta College students and faculty. When it was planted during Earth Week, April 19-23, 1971, the trees were only 4 to 5 feet tall.

## **2400 BUILDING** I Automotive Technology

Instructional courses for automotive technology can be found here, designed to prepare students for employment and advancement in the automotive field.

#### 2500 BUILDING | Diesel

Intructional courses for heavy duty diesel technology can be found here, designed to give the student entry-level job skills and enter into a diesel technology career.

#### **2600 BUILDING I Welding**

Intructional courses for the welding technology program can be found here, designed to prepare students for positions in a variety of trades or service industries requiring technically trained and/or certified welders.

## 4000-4900 BUILDINGS I Farm

Instructional courses for agriculture, horticulture, natural resources, agriculture equipment operations, landscaping, irrigation, and pest control can be found here. You also find cows, pigs, sheep, and goats. Farm Tours are available by appointment

#### 1800 & 1900 BUILDING | Athletics

The Athletic Department offices can be found here, along with our world class weight room, men's and women's lockers rooms, and coach's offices.

# **6000-6100 BUILDING** I Fire, EMS & Administration of Justice

Instructional courses for fire, EMS, and administration of justice can be found here, providing a dedicated, concentrated space to better serve our safety training programs, and support a higher quality of workforce training. The buildings also house three classrooms, the accompanying storage necessary for training equipment, and offices for the each program, its directors, and faculty.

#### 6500 BUILDING I Campus Safety

Offering students safe escorts to their vehicle, help with jump starting your car, campus and parking lot monitoring, and blue phones located around campus to directly connect you to Campus Safety.

#### FREEDOM ROCK

The idea of this project was to provide a safe place for students to access their right to Free Speech. In 1969, the Student Senate added Freedom Rock to the Shasta College landscape, a speaking platform for the use of all Shasta College students. During the construction of the 2300 building Freedom Rock was dismantled and the two massive boulders in the lawn outside the bookstore are all that remain. By law every college must provide a place where students can peacefully speak and/ or demonstrate. Therefore, the Student Senate felt the need and desire to reinstate a permanent place to practice this right, which led to the May 2011 dedication of a new podium on Freedom Lawn, next to Freedom Rock
